
The friendly, dedicated and hardworking staff at All Children's IPS strives to ensure that the time your child spends at primary school is as happy, memorable and rewarding as possible.

INTRODUCTION & OUR HISTORY

All Children's Integrated Primary School first opened its doors in September 1986 when a dedicated and forward thinking group of parents wanted to create a school which would allow Catholic and Protestant children to be educated together. An article in the newspaper at the time described how even a few months before the school opened the parents were looking for a site from which to run the school. When the school finally opened, it did so in temporary accommodation in St. John's Hall. The venture was far from without risk as parents and teachers invested their time into making a school with much uncertainty as to whether it would even be granted long-term financial assistance. It was definitely a time of much anxiety and sleepless nights. Over sixty applications were made to grant giving Trust Funds just to raise the £100,000 needed to run the school in its first year.

Staff, parents and governors from 'the early days' say that they were typified by a real pulling together by everyone involved. They describe the mobile classrooms where children were taught right up to 2005 as not of the highest standard as toadstools grew through the floorboards, some of which occasionally collapsed! They also say overriding everything was a great feeling of community. We now have a thriving school of over 200 children in a beautiful new purpose made building with a curriculum which combines strong pastoral care, high academic standards and a fully inclusive ethos where difference is celebrated no matter what faith, culture or nationality our families belong to.

This aim permeates the ethos of the school, the teaching styles and approaches and the pastoral care arrangements.

Our integrated status helps us provide an opportunity for children from the two main traditions in Northern Ireland as well as those of other traditions including those from a humanist perspective to develop a knowledge, understanding, appreciation and respect for their common culture.

All Children's ensures parents are fully involved in the life of the school. Children, teachers and parents form an essential triangle by working together in an open, positive and constructive partnership that provides the best learning environment for our children.

The school has a reputation for placing pastoral care and trying to ensure our pupils reach their academic potential regardless of ability at its heart. We hope we have created a place where the educational needs of children growing up in a diverse multi-cultural society are met.

THE NORTHERN IRELAND CURRICULUM

The Northern Ireland Curriculum is a statutory requirement that must be met by all schools. Its purpose is to ensure learning and teaching focuses on both the knowledge and skills required for lifelong learning.

At All Children's our pupils are given opportunities to have experience of all learning areas to ensure a broad and balanced education and one which will help them respond to the challenges of a rapidly changing technological world.

Our approach to teaching and learning promotes a child-centred educational approach with an emphasis on encouraging children to actively engage with their own learning. We place an emphasis on core areas of learning such as language, literacy, numeracy, ICT as well as developing their personal, social and thinking skills.

We endeavour to make school an exciting experience and hopefully one which will help them foster a love of learning which is so essential for success in today's busy world.



INTEGRATION

As an integrated primary school we encourage all our pupils to develop an awareness and interest in cultural diversity both locally and further afield. In recent years this has included celebrating the diverse range of languages, sport and music found in Northern Ireland. Workshops, displays, assemblies and visits help our children to explore and celebrate the world around them.

We have an extensive programme for helping children to explore and celebrate the traditions, values and customs of different minorities in Northern Ireland such as the Indian, Jewish and Islamic communities as well as the differences and similarities between the main churches found nearby.

Many of our children are involved in a Shared Education project with the P3 to P6 children from St. Mary's PS, Newcastle. This allows the children to get to know each other building friendships which will hopefully continue as the children grow up together in the local area. We also have extensive links with Shimna IC which is located beside us. These include joint assemblies to explore events such as Remembrance and St. Patrick's Day, extension workshops with Shimna's Year 8 students and joint environmental work.

We are currently working towards our Excellence in Integration Award which we hope to complete over the next year.

SPECIAL NEEDS EDUCATION

At All Children's care is taken at all times to match the curricular provision for all children to their particular stage of development, their abilities and interests.

We aim to meet these needs whether a child is achieving significantly beyond the rest of their year group (Gifted and Talented) or experiencing learning difficulties. Children's progress is closely monitored and, when necessary, extra support is provided. In consultation with the class teacher, some children may receive additional support from the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator and her team who provide Learning Support and/or relevant outside agencies.

When necessary, support is sought from the Educational Psychology Department within the EA (Education Authority) and close liaison is maintained with other child health professionals such as speech and language therapists, occupational therapists, paediatricians and RISE (Regional Integrated Support for Education in Northern Ireland).

We endeavour to ensure all pupils with Special Educational Needs are cherished, nurtured and respected without discrimination.

AFTER SCHOOL ACTIVITES

We offer a wealth of opportunities for children to participate in activities outside the formal curriculum. Our clubs are open to P1 to P7 children and meet from Monday to Friday during the hour following the normal school day.

Our programme of activities on offer is constantly developing and recently we have offered Ninja, arts & crafts, football, netball, scripture union, mountaineering at Tollymore NOC (P7s), tennis, multi-sports, into Film, cycling proficiency, drumming and languages (currently French & Japanese).

Our detailed programme ensures that All Children's children develop a breadth of skills in a relaxed and informal atmosphere under the guidance of professional coaches and teachers.

ENVIRONMENT

All Children's is located beside the Mourne Mountains (a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) and we are very fortunate to have access to not only the Mournes but Donard Forest and Newcastle beach both within five minutes walk from the school. The school building itself is built within the confines of an old walled garden and we have developed a wide range of curriculum activities to make the very most of our outdoors. As an Eco-school all our pupils will be engaged in a wide range of environmental activities helping them develop a love of our local and wider environment. With this work we are fortunate to be supported by local organisations including The Forestry Service, Mourne Heritage Trust and The Field Studies Council.

Our PE curriculum helps us foster key attitudes such as self-confidence, fairness, respect for others, determination and developing a healthy attitude to competition.



PARENTAL PARTNERSHIP

At All Children's Integrated Primary School we believe that effective communication between teachers and parents is essential for children's happiness and successful education.

Parents are involved at all levels of the school. They are encouraged to give of their time and skills as members of the Board of Governors and Parents Council Committee. As an integrated primary school we are fortunate to have increased parental representation on our Board of Governors. This ensures that all parents have good channels of communication between themselves and those people who are legally responsible for governing our school.

Parents assist in the school and support the teachers by accompanying classes on educational visits and running the Parents Council. Our Council is very active running major fundraising events during the year and supporting the work of the school through helping with consultations on curricular and non-curricular work alike. Parents also share their expertise by running workshops with classes to support on-going topic work.

Open, two way communication is the essential cornerstone of our parental partnership. We communicate regularly through letters and a 'Fortnightly Friday Note' which details all events happening during the following weeks. Our school website also details many of our school activities and our School App ensures quick communication with our school community.

Parent-Teacher consultations take place in October for Reception and P1 and in February for P2-P7. These help facilitate the exchange of information between parent and teacher, regarding each child's progress. Parents receive a school report each June summarising progress throughout the year.

Prospective parents are encouraged to make an appointment to visit the school and speak to the Principal or to attend the organised pre-school meetings.

Parents are very welcome in All Children's and the friendly trusting relationship between teachers and parents is very evident to all who visit the school.

PASTORAL CARE

All Children's Integrated Primary School has a reputation for child-centred education where children feel safe, valued and are encouraged to fulfil their potential. Staff are committed to looking after the pastoral needs of the child to dispel any worries and to resolve conflicts amicably when they arise. Children who are safe, happy and relaxed are more likely to experience academic success and accept new people and ideas.

Our approach to positive self-discipline ensures that children are encouraged to behave well and if things go wrong we have procedures for dealing with incidents to ensure no-one loses face or self-esteem. We celebrate children's achievements throughout the school.

We have a core set of whole school rules focussing on listening, good manners and respect and each class have rules which are agreed between the children and their teacher in order that they have ownership of them and are therefore more likely to abide by the agreed code of conduct. We use different buddy systems (within the playground and through reading) to help children of different ages to get to know each other and to instil in our older children a sense of responsibility.

A School Council and a Green 'Eco' Team operates in P4 to P7, as a forum for discussion of school and environmental issues and we hope these will instil in our pupils a sense of ownership and pride in their school.

At All Children's we view discipline as a partnership between home and school and we request the support of parents as we strive to instil a sense of responsibility, self-awareness and high self-esteem in our children.

Our detailed Pastoral Care procedures including our Positive Behaviour, Child Protection and Antibullying Policies are available on request from the office for parents with children who attend the school. Summaries of safeguarding and child protection approaches are given to all parents at the beginning of each year.

Our procedures for promoting internet safety including our Acceptable Use of Internet Policy is also available from the office.

HOMEWORK POLICY

Homework is seen as a means of communication between home and school. It helps to consolidate what a child is learning in school and is a way of building up good study habits. The time spent on homework gets increasingly longer as the child progresses through school. In P1 five to ten minutes is normal whereas one hour in P7 is usual.

Homework is not normally set for weekends or holiday times. Parents are encouraged to discuss the work with their child and sign it to show their approval. Homework assignments are varied and may not always involve written work. It may be the practice of various number or language skills, reading, finding information, collecting materials or recording data.

Homework should not cause distress. A quick note or word with the teacher will help ascertain wherther the problem was to do with the child not understanding the task, due to lack of attention and application, or if the work set was too difficult for the child.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

We expect all children to wear our school uniform with pride. Details are as follows:

- Grey skirt or pinafore/shorts or trousers
- School yellow polo-shirt
- Royal blue or grey tights or socks
- School navy blue sweatshirt
- Black shoes

During the summer term girls may wear a blue or yellow gingham check dress with white ankle socks.

P.E. KIT

Pupils wear a school yellow PE T-shirt and navy blue shorts for outdoor games and indoor PE.

Items can be purchased from a local supplier. For further details please contact the school office.

All items of personal clothing, including sportswear, should be clearly marked.

HEALTHY EATING

We adopt a Healthy Eating policy at All Children's. Reception to P1 have a healthy break each day and we encourage parents of P2 to P7 children to provide a fruit break and to limit the amount of sweet items throughout the school day. We encourage children to drink water freely in school.

DRUGS EDUCATION POLICY

All Children's Integrated Primary School promotes the development of the whole child. This encompasses physical, mental, emotional, social and environmental health. Recognising that young people in today's society are exposed to many risks, including those associated with drug misuse, All Children's has in place a comprehensive drugs policy.

Through this policy and associated schemes and activities we aim to equip our pupils with the appropriate knowledge, skills, attitudes and values to handle their lives effectively in the present and prepare them for adulthood.

Our Drugs Education Policy provides a guide as to how drugs education should be implemented and developed within the curriculum and also outlines the roles, responsibilites and legal duties of key staff. It forms an integral part of our existing Health Education, Pastoral Care and Child Protection programmes and complements these.

CONCERNS & COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

If parents have issues concerning the school curriculum or the safety of their child at All Children's, they should firstly approach the teacher. If as a consequence of that meeting they feel the matter is unresolved, the next step is to approach the Designated Teacher for Child Protection, if the issues relates to child safety, or the Principal for curriculum concerns. Any issues relating to child safety which are still not resolved should then also be dealt with via the Principal. We try to understand parents' worries about their children and usually assurances from our caring committed teaching staff dispel them.

If parents still feel that the issue is unresolved, they have the opportunity to put the matter in writing to the Chair of the Board of Governors, who will try and deal with the matter appropriately. Parent Governors represent the parent body and do not speak on behalf of individual parents.

If parents still feel the issue is unresolved the matter can then be referred to the office of the Northern Ireland Public Services Ombudsman.



INSPECTION OF DOCUMENTS

VISITING PROCEDURES

Prospective parents are encouraged to visit the school on Open Morning, which is held annually prior to Open Enrolment in January. Pupils transferring from other schools and their parents may visit the school by appointment and speak with the Principal Mr Jon Beattie who manages transfers and enrolments throughout the year. Parents will be given a copy of the School Prospectus.

ADMISSIONS

All Children's admission criteria for Reception and Primary 1 are listed on the EA website. In applying these criteria, the Board of Governors will strive to ensure the required balance of Protestant, Catholic, other religions and children of no religious affiliation. This is because as an integrated primary school, a key purpose of the school is to educate together children who come from these different groupings. Parents can find out more about the integrated ethos of the school in the Statement of Principles of Integrated Education which is available from the school.

For parents who would like their child to be enrolled in other years and when no places are currently available we have a Waiting List Policy which can be obtained from the school office.


